# Request for Decision

Sturgeon Valley Development Readiness Studies
That Council approve \$642,294 in funding from the Reserve & Debt Priority Reserve, and \$170,000 in funding from the Utility Capital Reserve, to secure required infrastructure related technical analysis in support of development in the Sturgeon Valley.
Administration recommends that Council approve the funding requested to support the technical studies required for development readiness in the Sturgeon Valley.

<ul> <li>Background Information</li> <li>Planning certainty in the Sturgeon Valley is a long-standing objective for Sturgeon County. Following through on regional policy that set forth specific planning process and development density requirements for the Sturgeon Valley Special Study Area, Sturgeon County initiated specific amendments to its Municipal Development Plan (MDP) and Sturgeon Valley Core Area Structure Plan, and the creation of a new Sturgeon Valley South Area Structure Plan.</li> </ul>
• In addition to robust technical analysis and expert consideration, these plans were subject to widespread "Our Future Valley" landowner and resident engagement. The technical analysis for the Area Structure Plan (ASP) approvals included:
<ul> <li>Traffic Analysis</li> <li>Fiscal Impact Assessment</li> <li>Stormwater Analysis Study</li> <li>Environmental Analysis</li> </ul>

- Agricutlural Impact Assessment
- Water and Wastewater servicing concept
- Since the approval of the Sturgeon Valley Area Structure Plans, Administration has taken steps to:
  - Commence updates to the Land Use Bylaw and General Municipal Servicing Standards to accommodate the higher density requirements in the Valley South area;
  - Update the financial analysis on the infrastructure investments required to support future development; and
  - Commence reviews of the off-site levy model and policy to ensure that "growth pays for growth".
- The need for additional technical analysis was identified to support the
  future development of the Sturgeon Valley Core and South areas. These
  analyses provide necessary detail on infrastructure costs, design
  requirements, and data required to support informed decisions. These
  studies provide a solid foundation in understanding the County's
  infrastructure and operational needs and costs into the future.
- Approximately \$1.1 million in analysis is required to support Valley development. There are identified funding sources for \$315,240, with the remaining \$812,294 requiring funding. Immediate analysis requirements include:
  - Planning analyses:
    - \$67,240 Funded in 2022 Budget
  - Financial analyses:
    - \$92,383 Funded in 2022 Budget
    - \$60,000 Funding requirement
  - Standards completion:
    - \$157,294 Funding requirement
  - Infrastructure analyses:
    - \$125,000 Funded in 2022 Budget
    - \$300,000 Funding requirement
  - Utilities analyses:
    - \$295,000 Funding requirement
  - Open Spaces & Trails:
    - \$30,000 Funded in 2021 Budget
- A total amount of \$812,294 is required to complete the noted unfunded studies/analyses, further described in Attachment 1.

## **External Communication**

 Administration has worked closely with area landowners and developers on planning requirements for the Sturgeon Valley, and continues to collaborate on pending development applications, outline plans, neighbourhood structure plans, and area structure plan amendments.

# Implication of Administrative Recommendation

## Strategic Alignment:

- Planned Growth The identified studies are required to support responsible growth in the Sturgeon Valley South development area.
   Additionally, they will provide the foundation for establishing reliable and effective infrastructure planning.
- Operational Excellence The studies will ensure that the County has a solid understanding of the infrastructure costs, designs, and long-term operational and maintenance needs in the Valley.

## Organizational:

 Administration has the required capacity to conduct the required analyses, by overseeing the work of contracted service providers. The results of these studies will guide infrastructure development in the Valley and assist in the preparation of capital plans, off-site levies, and assist Council and Administration in prioritizing projects.

#### Financial:

- The study costs total \$812,294, with \$642,294 funded from the Reserve & Debt Priority Reserve and \$170,000 funded from the Utility Capital Reserve.
- The uncommitted Reserve & Debt Priority Reserve balance is \$2,186,574. If Council were to commit \$642,294 to the Sturgeon Valley development readiness studies, the remaining balance would be \$1,544,280.
- The uncommitted Utility Capital Reserve Balance is \$4,127,165. If Council were to commit \$170,000 to the Sturgeon Valley development readiness studies, the remaining balance would be \$3,957,165.
- The study costs would not be recoverable through the off-site levy model as the County is only allowed to levy for capital infrastructure (costs will not be capitalized).

## Alternatives Considered

#### Option A – Decline Funding / Do Not Proceed with Analyses

Do not proceed with the analyses, and potentially not proceed with updates to the County's general municipal servicing standards and/or off-site levies.

## Option B – Stage Analyses Over Time

Stage the studies so that costs are spread across more years, for example deferring a study to 2024.

## Implications of Alternatives

#### Strategic Alignment:

- Neither option is aligned with Council's priorities as they would not be prioritizing Council's desire for timely but planned growth in the Sturgeon Valley.
- The delay of study completion will delay updates to Sturgeon Valley
  General Municipal Servicing Standards (GMSS) and off-site levy updates.
  This would not be supported by area landowners/developers who are
  desirous of expedited completion and could harm the County's working
  relationships with those stakeholders.

## Organizational:

- Both options would leave gaps in Administration's understanding of the full infrastructure requirements of the Sturgeon Valley and would not provide the data necessary to provide guidance to Council and developers on infrastructure needs and capital planning.
- Option A In the absence of the studies, developers would not have a clear representation of the infrastructure required to support growth in the Valley, and Administration would be unable to provide that requested clarity.
- Option B While organizational capacity would be supported by sequencing the reviews over time, the timely completion of this analyses is required to inform the timely completion of GMSS and offsite levy updates.

#### Financial:

- Option A No financial requirement would exist.
- Option B The financial requirement could be committed now or at a future point in time if deferred. The total cost of the studies may need to be reviewed if deferred to a later point in time to ensure no pricing adjustments occurred.

#### **Follow up Action**

- 1. Allocate the Debt Priority Reserve and utility rate model towards the identified studies (Financial Services, March 2022).
- 2. Commence procurement required to complete the identified studies (Infrastructure Services, March 2022).
- 3. Complete required studies for inclusion in municipal standards and costing models (Infrastructure Services, Q3 2022).
