Request for Decision

Title	Contract Award: Glory Hills Subdivision and Rol-Anna Park Rehabilitation
Proposed Motion	That Council award the contract for the Glory Hills Subdivision and Rol-Anna Park Rehabilitation project to Knelsen Sand & Gravel Ltd. at a contract price of \$3,649,818.96 (excluding GST) and authorize the Chief Administrative Officer to execute the contract.
Administrative Recommendation	Administration recommends that Council award the contract for the Glory Hills Subdivision and Rol-Anna Park Rehabilitation project to Knelsen Sand & Gravel Ltd. as the lowest compliant bidder.

Report	 Background Information Glory Hills Subdivision: The Glory Hills Subdivision Rehabilitation project includes Galaxy Way (0.8 kilometres) and Zodiak Drive (3.0 kilometres) for a total length of 3.8 kilometres of road rehabilitation within the subdivision. The work will consist of pulverizing, salvaging, hauling, placing/compacting existing granular material, and surfacing the road with a new asphalt structure.
	 Rol-Anna Park: The Rol-Anna Park Rehabilitation project includes McFeeters Road, which is 0.8 kilometres in length. This work has the same rehabilitation strategy as Glory Hills, which consists of pulverizing, salvaging, hauling, and placing/compacting existing granular material, and surfacing the road with a new asphalt structure.
	External Communication
	 Tendering Tenders for the Glory Hills Subdivision and Rol-Anna Park Rehabilitation project were advertised on Alberta Purchasing Connection (APC) starting February 25, 2022. The tender period closed on March 21, 2022.
	• Nine (9) compliant bids were received, ranging from \$3,649,818.96 to \$4,639,511 (excluding GST).
	 The tenders were reviewed, and it is recommended that Sturgeon County award the contract for the Glory Hills Subdivision and Rol-Anna Park Rehabilitation project to Knelsen Sand and Gravel Ltd. as the lowest compliant bidder.

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Communications

 Construction information signs will be installed, and notifications will be mailed to all affected residents following the contract award and prior to construction startup.

Relevant Policy/Legislation/Practices:

Procurement Policy

- Invitation to Tender is identified as the acceptable method of procurement for construction contracts and other high value procurements.
- Sturgeon County's standard for communicating competitive procurement opportunities is through the Alberta Purchasing Connection.
- Purchases exceeding \$500,000 are to be ratified at the following Council Meeting.
- The Chief Administrative Officer shall be signing authority for all Construction or Capital contracts over \$500,000.

Implication of Administrative Recommendation

Strategic Alignment:

Planned Growth – The awarding of this contract is consistent with: *Reliable and effective infrastructure.*

Operational Excellence – The awarding of this contract is consistent with: *Quality cost-effective service delivery; asset management and performance measurement.*

Organizational:

 The awarding of this contract will reduce the maintenance requirements of this road segment thereby freeing up additional capacity to maintain Sturgeon County's service commitment to operational excellence.

Financial:

- To date, \$43,000 has been spent on feasibility, design, and procurement.
- As per the below table, the estimated total cost to complete the Glory Hills Subdivision and Rol-Anna Park Rehabilitation project is \$3,929,462.63. There is currently \$4,560,000 in available funds.

Organizational:

 By not awarding the contract, Sturgeon County would be required to continue intensive maintenance requiring further resources to maintain an acceptable level of service.

Financial:

 Not awarding the contract would only temporarily defer the required capital renewal cost for this asset.

- 2. Send notification letters to residents and install construction information signs (Transportation & Engineering Services, Q2 2022).
