## Administrative Recommendation

Administration recommends that Council give three readings of Bylaw 1595/22 to amend the 2022 Fees and Charges Bylaw to establish fees for the Broadband Initiative.

#### Report

#### **Background Information**

- At the February 23, 2021 Council meeting, Council directed Administration to proceed with the procurement of Phase 1 of the Broadband Initiative project.
- On April 27, 2021, Council passed Bylaw 1530/21 to authorize a debenture of \$7.3 million for Phase 1 of the Broadband Initiative.
- The goal of the initiative is to build and operate a fast, reliable, and affordable broadband network through a partnership where the County and a private sector partner contribute financially to the creation of the network, the partner builds, operates, and maintains the network, and retailers offer services to residents and businesses.

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- The principles of this initiative include:
  - Investing along with the private sector to expand fibre-based broadband service availability in the County,
  - Ensuring that taxpayer investments are protected,
  - Providing services that are reliable, fast, and affordable,
  - Encouraging innovation,
  - Allowing residents and businesses to obtain broadband services from their choice of competitive retail provider,
  - Providing fibre to the premises in hamlets, subdivisions, and business parks, and
  - Enabling rural residents not serviced by fibre to the premises to benefit from improved backhaul and potential future fibre network expansion.
- The County's strategy includes two phases:
  - Phase 1 includes the hamlets, subdivisions, business/industrial parks, and residences along the fibre path the southwest portion of the County. This includes a number of strategic priority areas including Villeneuve Airport, ProNorth Industrial Park, and Heritage Industrial Park as well as the hamlets of Villeneuve, Calahoo, and Rivière Qui Barre. This phase will be funded through the \$7.3 million debenture approved by Council and \$250,000 in reserve funding approved at the March 22, 2022 Council meeting. It is anticipated that construction of the network will commence in the spring of 2022, to be completed by end of 2022.
  - Future phase(s) include the remaining hamlets, subdivisions, business/industrial parks, and residences and businesses along the fibre path in the County. This phase will be funded through future budget consideration. If fully funded, it is anticipated that construction can commence as early as 2023.
- Following an extensive procurement process, at the September 14, 2021
  Regular Council Meeting, Council authorized the Chief Administrative
  Officer to execute the Broadband Initiative Phase One Agreement with
  the top-ranked proponent subject to the successful conclusion of
  contract negotiations.
- Administration concluded contract negotiations in November 2021 and awarded the project to Canadian Fiber Optics Corporation (CFOC). CFOC is experienced in funding, designing, building, and operating fast and reliable rural internet networks.
- Representatives from CFOC were in attendance at the February 22, 2022 Committee of the Whole Meeting, and with Administration, provided an update on recent activity, next steps, and key messages as the County and CFOC prepare to complete the Phase 1 Broadband Initiative in 2022.

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- Since the February 22, 2022 Council meeting, and in alignment with the principles and scope approved by Council, the Phase 1 design has been finalized.
- At the March 22, 2022 Regular Council Meeting, Council approved the Public Communications Plan, which identifies the goals, audiences, and tactics that will be employed to communicate this initiative to residents, businesses owners, and other stakeholders.

## Bylaw 1595/22 – Amendment to the 2022 Fees and Charges Bylaw for the Broadband Initiative

• Bylaw 1595/22 proposes to amend the 2022 Fees and Charges Bylaw to establish fees and charges to include the following:

### **Horizontal Drilling**

• Bringing fibre from the road to a house is done by plowing a narrow 30cm-deep channel and burying a small conduit which holds and protects the fibre. Ploughing is minimally invasive but can leave a mark on the lawn until it recovers. As an option, a property owner can request that horizontal drilling be used. Horizontal drilling avoids this disruption by boring the channel under the lawn, leaving marks only at the property line and at the exit point at the home. Due to the wide variety of conditions, a custom quote for this work will be provided on request.

#### **Broadband Fibre Installation**

 A property owner in the Extended Service Area can choose to have fibre extended to their home or business at cost. The County will arrange to have conduit and fibre installed from the nearest fibre access point to the home or business. This includes bringing the fibre to and into the selected entry point into the building. Due to the unique nature of each situation, the County will provide a quote for the agreement.

## **Drop Conduit**

• Some homeowners or businesses in the Extended Service Area may be interested in reducing the cost of installation by installing their own drop conduit (the conduit that runs from the property line to the building). The County will provide the requested length of approved conduit and the special couplers needed to complete the installation, along with any installation standards that must be followed. Once the conduit is installed, the County's service provider will install the fibre itself and connect it to the building. Note that home and business owners can only perform this work on their own private property – the County service provider must do any work on public property, like ditches, roads and trails. Property owners can arrange to pick up the conduit and couplers or have them delivered to the property at extra cost.

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#### **External Communication**

- Administration will communicate the fees and charges through scheduled public communications. The Broadband Initiative Communications Plan was approved at the March 22, 2022 Regular Council Meeting.
- Administration continues to update the Broadband Initiative information on the County's website at www.sturgeoncounty.ca/getconnected.
