Request for Decision

Title | 2022 Subsidized Dust Suppression Program **Proposed Motion** 1. That Council approve the 2022 fully subsidized dust suppression treatments in front of residences as identified in Attachment 1. 2. That Council approve a subsidy of \$205 per residence for dust suppression treatments as identified in Attachment 2. 3. That Council approve the locations identified in Attachment 3 for fully subsidized dust suppression treatments in 2022, at an additional cost of \$42,185.00, to be funded from the General Operating Reserve. Administrative Administration recommends that Council approve locations identified for **Recommendation** subsidized calcium chloride dust suppression treatment. Report

Background Information

- Sturgeon County's Dust Suppression Policy specifies that responsible party(ies) will be required to provide dust control to accommodate residents that are located along a designated haul route.
- The County has accepted responsibility as the responsible party in previous years for the following locations identified in Attachment 1:
 - Township Road 544 from Highway 2 to Coal Mine Road;
 - Range Road 251 south route to Roseridge Landfill;
 - Sturgeon Valley routes to the Summerbrook Truck Fill and for residential construction access routes due to road bans;
 - Gibbonslea/Lost Point Lake Access Road;
 - Heartland Traffic Mitigation;
 - o Range Road 261 north-south to Northern Lights;
 - Range Road 255 (4 miles Township Road 564 north of Westmor Terminal's entrance);
 - Range Road 231 (6 miles between Highway 643 to Range Road 552);
 - Legal Alfalfa Road (Range Road 252A);
 - Range Road 260 north to Highway 37 due to ProNorth Industrial Park road bans;
 - o Range Road 260 south of ProNorth Industrial Park;
 - Routes near Sturgeon Industrial Park (SIP) and Lamoureux connection to Highway 37 to accommodate Alberta Transportation capital project improvements/congestion;
 - o Routes to the previous Heartland Traffic Mitigation routes;
 - o Range Road 232 from Township Road 572 to Highway 651;
 - o Range Road 234 from Highway 37 North to Township Road 560;
 - o Range Road 255 south of Highway 642 for a 2-mile stretch;
 - Township Road 580 West of Highway 2;
 - Range Road 262 from bridge north of Fairhaven Subdivision for 250 metres;
 - Waterdale Subdivision;
 - o Juniper Hills Subdivision;
 - Range Road 220 from Township Road 570 north to Redwater;
 - Range Road 225 from Township Road 554 to the major Equine Center; and

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- Township Road 572 from Highway 28 to Austin Acres.
- In prior years, Council has authorized a subsidy of \$205 per residence for the following locations, identified in Attachment 2;
 - Gravel section of Highway 651;
 - Range Road 240 north of Bon Accord to Township Road 564; and
 - Range Road 252 north of Highway 651 to Leomar
- The following locations are being proposed to be added to the list of sites that Sturgeon County has accepted responsibility as the responsible party for dust suppression:
 - Township Road 545 between Range Roads 275 and 280;
 - Township Road 582 east of Lily Lake Road to end of subdivision (Clearview Acres and Braun Village);
 - Range Road 230, 360 meters south of Vista Road to creek;
 - Township Road 554 from Range Road 234 and Range Road 240; and
 - Township Road 542 from Range Road 250 and Range Road 251.

Implication of Administrative Recommendation

Strategic Alignment:

Thriving Communities – By providing this service, the County re-affirms its commitment to safe, welcoming, and diverse communities; small community feel and personal connection; commitment to high quality of life for impacted.

Organizational:

The additional sites will require additional time to complete. It is expected that the dust suppression program will be completed in June.

Financial:

Funding for the proposed subsidized sites is to be drawn from the General Operating Reserve.

Alternatives

Council could add or remove roads from the proposed list of fully subsidized **Considered** roads for dust suppression.

Implications of **Alternatives**

Organizational:

Additional roads would take longer to schedule in the field; however, Administration has the capacity to deliver the program with minor changes.

Financial:

The funding impact would be dependent on Council's direction.

Follow up Action

Provide fully subsidized dust suppression treatment at the sites approved by Council (Transportation and Engineering Services, Q2 2022).
