Administrative Recommendation	Administration recommends that Council give three readings of Bylaw 1599/22 to initiate the Local Improvement Bylaw for a waterline improvement to the Trestle Ridge community.			
Previous Council / Committee Direction	None.			
Report	 Background Information Trestle Ridge is subdivision located within Sturgeon Valley. It is a community consisting of seven (7) individual residences on Trestle Ridge Place at the end of Range Road 250, north of Township Road 544A. 			
	The community currently has individual water cisterns which are filled by water trucks regularly.			
	Water and wastewater servicing is located approximately 700 metres north of the Riverstone subdivision. A tie-in connection from the Riverstone subdivision is possible along Range Road 250.			
	Representatives of Trestle Ridge requested Sturgeon County explore the feasibility and costs for constructing a trickle-fill watermain to their homes as a means of improving servicing in the area.			
	• On September 16, 2021, Sturgeon County sent a letter and survey to the property owners of Trestle Ridge. The survey was initiated to gauge the level of support for a possible waterline improvement.			
	• On September 30, 2021, the survey had closed, and four out of six residents responded to the survey. Of the four respondents, all were in favour.

- In early January 2022, Sturgeon County was advised that a new landowner was looking to subdivide their property and would require four additional connections. The addition of the four water connections would bring the total to eleven benefitting parcels.
- With more properties connecting, the price per lot would be reduced. As
 a result of the increased interest, residents requested the County to
 explore pricing on a full pressure water system connection, rather than a
 trickle-fill system.
- Administration requested that qualified contractors provide pricing to complete the project. Based on lump sum pricing, the estimated project cost is \$232,772.00 (includes 20% contingency and 10% engineering).
- On March 25, 2022, Sturgeon County provided residents the Local Improvement Plan, which entailed the total project estimate and a cost per lot calculation.
- On April 4, 2022, Sturgeon County received a petition signed by nine (out of eleven) benefitting parcels.
- On May 3, 2022, Sturgeon County received a second petition signed by eleven (out of eleven) benefitting parcels.
- Neither of the petitions submitted were deemed sufficient in accordance with the requirements of the *Municipal Government Act* due to technical issues with the filing of witness affidavits, inclusion of a privacy statement in the body of the petition, and other technical deficiencies. As the petitions are insufficient, Council is not required to take notice of them.
- Regardless of the sufficiency of the petitions filed, it is apparent that
 there is broad community support for the local improvement. Council
 can advance the local improvement on its own initiative in response to
 the desire of the benefitting residents.
- Legal counsel has advised that, since notice of the local improvement plan was sent out to all benefitting property owners and no one has filed a petition against it, Council can proceed with all three readings of the Bylaw.
- Administration recommends that Council give three readings of the Bylaw to enable Administration to prepare the borrowing bylaw required to finance the cost of the local improvement to be funded in whole by the local improvement tax.
- The borrowing bylaw will be presented for consideration of three readings at the June 14, 2022 Regular Council Meeting.

External Communication

- Letters, surveys, and regular emails updates were sent to residents throughout the project.
- On March 25, 2022, all benefitting residents received notice of the Trestle Ridge Waterline Local Improvement Plan, which specified the total cost of the project, as well as a cost per lot estimation.

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Relevant Policy/Legislation/Practices

- Section 393(1) of the *Municipal Government Act* (MGA) allows Council the ability to initiate a Local Improvement Tax on its own initiative.
- Section 397(2) of the Municipal Government Act (MGA) authorizes
 Council to impose a Local Improvement Tax for the purposes of raising revenue to pay for a local improvement.

Implication of Administrative Recommendation

Strategic Alignment:

- A borrowing bylaw will be prepared to debenture finance the construction of this Local Improvement.
- Schedule A of the Trestle Ridge Waterline Local Improvement Tax contains financial details of the Local Improvement Plan.
- The estimated cost to complete the waterline project is \$232,772.00 (includes 20% contingency and 10% engineering).
- There are eleven benefitting residents. This amounts to \$21,161.09 (plus interest) per lot.

Council could give only first reading of the Bylaw at the May 24, 2022 Council meeting.
