Report	 Background Information The St. Albert – Sturgeon County Intermunicipal Affairs Committee (IAC) was established by bylaw in 2014 with the intent of facilitating cooperation and collaboration between the City of St. Albert and Sturgeon County.
	• This bylaw has not been substantially updated since its establishment, with the exception of a Memorandum of Understanding that was added as Schedule "A" to the bylaw in November 2014. As such, the City and County undertook efforts to review and amend the terms of the IAC in the spring and fall of 2022.
	• The overall intent of the amended IAC Bylaw remains unchanged. Revisions include:
	 Formatting, definitions, and language updates;

	 Changing the meeting frequency from three times per year to twice per year; 				
	 Including information pertaining to additional meeting requests, meeting cancellation procedure, updating of clauses for dispute resolution; and 				
	 Updating deadlines for agenda circulation dates and meeting minutes distribution. 				
	 During the last IAC meeting (October 26, 2022), Committee members approved recommended bylaw updates and supported a motion directing each respective Council to approve the updated St. Albert – Sturgeon County Intermunicipal Affairs Committee (IAC) Bylaw before end of year. The City of St. Albert Council passed its St. Albert – Sturgeon County Intermunicipal Affairs Committee (IAC) Bylaw on December 6, 2022. 				
	 <u>External Communication</u> As no substantial changes are being made to the Bylaw at this time, and the overall intent remains consistent, no public communication or engagement in advance of this change is proposed. 				
	 <u>Relevant Policy/Legislation/Practices</u> Section 145 of the <i>Municipal Government Act</i> (MGA) provides that Council may pass bylaws to establish council committees and define their functions. 				
Implication of Administrative Recommendation	<u>Strategic Alignment</u> Collaborative Governance : This bylaw is consistent with legislation outlined in the MGA, allowing for council committees to be formed and regarding prescribed composition of council committees; it also follows the spirit of intermunicipal collaboration as identified in Part 17.2 of the MGA.				
	Collaborative Governance: This bylaw enables the continued collaboration between the City of St. Albert and Sturgeon County, meeting the community goal of collaborative governance. Predictable and stable external relationships is an outcome that will be advanced under this bylaw approval.				
Alternatives Considered	Council could decide to not pass Bylaw 1614/22, or to pass only first and/or second reading of the bylaw.				
Considered Implications of	second reading of the bylaw. <u>Strategic Alignment</u> If the bylaw is not passed, the current bylaw wording would remain. Postponing approval, or rejection, of Bylaw 1614/22 may affect Sturgeon County's intermunicipal relationship with the City of St. Albert, as both
