Proposed Motion	That Council give first reading of Bylaw 1626/23.			
Administrative Recommendation	That Council give first reading to Bylaw 1626/23 to allow for the proposed bylaw to proceed to a Public Hearing to receive feedback from affected parties.			
Previous Council / Committee Direction	January 11, 2022 Regular Council Meeting Motion 014/22: That Council approve the Conditional Sale and Purchase Agreement dated October 6, 2021 for Plan 1945Rs, Lot A and consent to the closure of the undeveloped road allowance in accordance with section 24 of the Municipal Government Act.			
	April 27, 2021 Regular Council Meeting Motion 264/21: That Council approve an expenditure of up to \$450,000 for the Bridge Project itemized in Attachment 1 to be funded by Road Network Reserve.			
Report	 Background Information The exceptional 1 in 100-year precipitation event of Spring of 2020 resulted in Bridge Culvert BF 85388 (Range Road 263 north of Highway 633) washing out. 			
	 A rented temporary bridge was installed shortly after this incident to provide access to affected residences while design and land acquisition for a replacement bridge was completed. 			
	The land acquisition for this project necessitated consideration for closure and disposal of the referenced undeveloped road allowance.			
	Construction of the bridge culvert was completed in November 2021 and is currently under warranty.			
	The proposed closure and disposal of the undeveloped road allowance will conclude agreements associated with acquiring land from adjacent landowners to expand County's rights-of-way requirements for the replacement bridge.			

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- In January 2022, Council gave consent to the closure and sale of the undeveloped road allowance as detailed on Schedule "A" in accordance with a conditional sale and purchase agreement.
- To satisfy Ministerial requirements, it was deemed that the bylaw process be utilized. The bylaw process allows for the completion of any and all requirements to conclude closure of the road allowance.
- The County's legal counsel will be in attendance at the March 28, 2023
 Council meeting to provide additional information to Council on the road closure requirements provided in the *Municipal Government Act* and to answer questions members of Council may have.

External Communication

 Advertisement for the Public Hearing on the proposed road closure will be placed in local newspapers, on the County's website, through the County's social media platforms, and directly to affected residents as required by the *Municipal Government Act*.
