Title 2:00 p.m. Public Hearing – Bylaw 1626/23 – Road Closure Bylaw – Area 'A' Plan 232 0067

The Public Hearing is an opportunity for Council to receive comments from the public regarding proposed Bylaw 1626/23, to close an undeveloped road allowance lying within Area 'A' Plan 232 0067.

Report

Background Information

- The exceptional 1 in 100-year precipitation event that occurred in Spring of 2020, resulted in Bridge Culvert BF 85388 (Range Road 263 north of Highway 633) washing out.
- A rented temporary bridge was installed shortly after this incident to provide access to affected residences while design and land acquisition for a replacement bridge was completed.
- The land acquisition for this project necessitated consideration for closure and disposal of the referenced undeveloped road allowance.
- Construction of the bridge culvert was completed in November 2021 and is currently under warranty.
- The proposed closure and disposal of the undeveloped road allowance will conclude agreements associated with acquiring land from adjacent landowners to expand the County's rights-of-way requirements for the replacement bridge.

- In January 2022, Council gave consent to the closure and sale of the undeveloped road allowance, outlined on Schedule "A" in accordance with a conditional sale and purchase agreement.
- To satisfy Ministerial requirements, it was deemed that the bylaw process be utilized. The bylaw process allows for the completion of all requirements to conclude closure of the road allowance.
- The County's legal counsel attended the March 28, 2023, Regular Council
 meeting and provided additional information to Council on the road
 closure requirements provided in the Municipal Government Act.
- The Public Hearing is an opportunity for Council to hear from the public regarding the proposed road allowance closure.
- Section 22(3) of the Municipal Government Act (MGA) provides that no road may be closed by bylaw of a municipal council in Alberta unless the bylaw is approved by the Minister of Transportation and Economic Corridors before it receives second reading. Therefore, once the Public Hearing is closed, the Bylaw will be sent to the Minister for approval before Council can consider subsequent readings of the Bylaw.

External Communication

- Advertisements for the Public Hearing were published in the St. Albert Gazette on March 30, 2023 and April 6, 2023, and in the Redwater Review and Morinville Free Press on March 29, 2023, and April 5, 2023.
- Affected landowners were notified directly by mail.

Relevant Policy/Legislation/Practices

• Municipal Government Act, sections 22 and 606

Implication

Planned Growth – This facilitates completion of the emergency bridge replacement and demonstrates commitment to the community, maintaining and updating existing infrastructure.

Organizational

 Administration will pursue the necessary Ministerial authorization needed to complete the road allowance closure.

Financial

- The County is responsible for fees associated with land title registration and associated legal fees.
- The acquisition of the land associated with the closure will take effect when all legislated requirements have been fully satisfied.

Follow Up Action

1. Submit the proposed Bylaw to the Minister of Transportation & Economic Corridors for Ministerial approval prior to Council considering second reading of the Bylaw (Transportation & Engineering Services, Q2 2023).
