Report	Background Information		
·	Historical Context		
	Sturgeon County is home to a rich built and cultural heritage comprised		
	of unique stories, trails, and historical assets.		
	The County resides in Treaty 6 Territory, and on the traditional lands of		
	many Indigenous peoples, including the Cree, Métis, and other First Nations groups, who have inhabited this place for thousands of years,		
	and continue to do so.		
	The County's development has been greatly influenced by travel routes,		
	including the Sturgeon River, trails, and later rail and highways, which facilitated transportation, trade, and prosperity for Indigenous Peoples		
	and settlers alike.		
	Inventories (Surveys) and Designation		
	• In Alberta, historic sites are identified through a 'survey' process which is		
	a collection of records about non-archeological historic places that are older than 50 years of age. (Note: Villeneuve Airport was built in 1976)		
	older than 30 years of age. (Note: Villefleuve All port was built in 1970)		
	The Alberta Heritage Survey includes sites in Sturgeon County. There are		
	34 properties listed, including sheds, barns, residential dwellings,		
	commercial facilities etc. It is a work in progress including data from		
	many sources. The full list is provided in Attachment 1.

- A municipality can complete a more thorough historic survey by undertaking primary source research and extensive public engagement.
- Sites considered for historic designation are then prioritized from the survey in collaboration with the property owner and through bylaw in accordance with its 'Statement of Significance' (SOS) which specifies exactly what makes the site special and worth preserving.
- Once designated, a historic resource is normally placed on the 'Register of Historic Places' with the Province.
- Administration undertook a scan of provincial and federal designated sites. Three sites in Sturgeon County are registered as historic resources.
 The detailed list is provided in Attachment 2:
 - o Municipal Historic Resource: Eldorena Church;
 - Provincial Historic Resource: Notre Dame De Lourdes (Our Lady of Lourdes) Roman Catholic Church; and
 - National Historic Site of Canada: Fort Augustus & Fort Edmonton.
- No historic trails within Sturgeon County are currently designated on either Register.
- Heritage conservation and preservation provide a huge potential to make our natural, built and cultural heritage come alive by telling the stories and acknowledging our past in a way that sets us apart.
- However, the County's history continues to be lost as time and growth opportunities evolve.
- Heritage conservation and preservation is not a current undertaking or level of service provided by Sturgeon County. The County does not have a standard approach, defined organizational resource, or criteria to support heritage places.
