Title	2024 Community Grant Allocations
Proposed Motion	1. That Council approve Casa Vista Country Club #3 as a Recognized Community Association.
	 That Council approve the Community Services Advisory Board recommendation to award 2024 Community Grants in the amount of \$279,904 to the community groups identified in Attachment 1, with funding as follows: \$72,053 from 2024 Operating Budget – Grants to Organizations \$151,856 from Community Enhancement Reserve (\$104,939 from Component B and \$46,917 from Component C) \$55,995 from Sturgeon Industrial Community Fund Reserve (\$23,196 from Component A, \$11,598 from Component B and \$21,201 from Component C).
	 That Council approve the Sand and Gravel Advisory Committee recommendation to award the 2024 Community Grants in the amount of \$232,912 to the community groups identified in Attachment 2, with funding as follows: \$17,210 from 2024 Operating Budget – Grants to Organizations \$215,702 from Community Enhancement Reserve (\$209,878 from Component A, \$5,824 from Component C).
Administrative Recommendation	Administration recommends that Council approve Casa Vista Country Club #3 as a Recognized Community Association.
	Administration further recommends that Council award the grants as recommended by the Community Services Advisory Board and the Sand and Gravel Advisory Committee. These recommendations were debated and supported by both Council Committees during their respective meetings in March and April of 2024.

Report	 <u>Background Information</u> To be eligible for Community Grant funding, a group must be identified as a "Recognized Community Association" by Sturgeon County. Prior to

2015, Sturgeon County listed Casa Vista Country Club #2 as a Recognized				
Community Association. The Association lost its Society status with the				
Province in 2015. On October 23, 2016, the Casa Vista County Club #3				
was officially approved as a Society by the Province and remains in good				
standing.

Policy – Exemption of Development Application fees for				
Recognized Community Associations is "an independent,				

- Recognized Community Associations is "an independent, registered and volunteer not-for-profit organization operating facilities and amenities within the corporate boundary of Sturgeon County, with a mandate to provide programming and services to the general public and accordingly, recognized by Sturgeon County Community Services. Such an organization is registered in terms of the *Societies Act* RSA 2000, s-14 and in good standing."
- The deadline to apply for a 2024 Sturgeon County Community Association grant was February 5, 2024. Recognized senior organizations could apply for an operating grant and recognized community associations could apply for both an operating and capital grant.
 - Between the two grant streams, 26 volunteer organizations submitted applications and \$512,816 in funding was requested.
 - The Community Services Advisory Board (CSAB) received \$72,053 in requests for Operating Funding and is recommending that Council approve all requests. The CSAB received \$207,851 in requests for Capital Enhancement Funding and is recommending that Council approve all requests.
 - The Sand and Gravel Advisory Committee (SGAC) received \$17,210 in requests for Operating Funding and is recommending that Council approve all requests. The SGAC received \$215,702 in requests for Capital Enhancement Funding and is recommending that Council approve all requests.
 - In Budget 2024, Council approved an increase of 4% to the maximum operating grant available, with Recognized Community Associations able to apply for up to \$4,780 (increased from \$4,600) and Recognized Seniors Associations able to apply for up to \$1,435 (increased from \$1,380).
