Title	Starkey Road Functional Planning Study Update		
Proposed Motion	That Council approve funding of up to \$170,000 from Municipal Tax Stabilization Reserve to update the existing Starkey Road Functional Planning Study.		
Administrative Recommendation	Administration recommends that Council approve the required funding to update the Starkey Road Functional Planning Study.		
Previous Council / Committee Direction	None		
Report	 The Starkey Road Functional Planning Study was last updated in April 2013. Since that time, several factors have arisen that require an update to the study, including: Alberta Transportation and Economic Corridors (ATEC) has updated their highway corridor designations along roadways and access management guidelines. The need to verify whether the forecasted realignment of Starkey Road to Range Road 252 and its connection to Highway 37 is still necessary. Finding of the Transportation Master Plan that identified updating the Starkey Road Functional Planning Study as a priority. The reflection of the Sturgeon Valley Core and the Sturgeon Valley South Area Structure Plans. The need to assess and evaluate the perceived increase in traffic volume from regional and potential local growth, and ensure capital plans align with infrastructure priorities in the Valley. The Study will identify and help the County protect a suitable roadway corridor. Administration has identified the following timelines for implementation: Request for proposal posted June 2025 Award to the consultant in July 2025 Review of existing reports, consultation with Alberta Transportation and Economic Corridors (ATEC) in Fall 2025 		

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- Draft recommendations for Winter, 2025
- o Public engagement in Q1, 2026
- o Report Finalization in Q2, 2026

- If approved by Council, public advertising will occur to request Consultant Proposals for review and potential award.
- Council and public engagement sessions would be held.

Implication of Administrative Recommendation

Strategic Alignment

Completing an update to the Starkey Road Functional Planning Study would protect Sturgeon County's future infrastructure requirements and address current and potential future needs, as well as ensure alignment with our new General Municipal Servicing Standards.

Operational Excellence –The update of the Starkey Road Functional Planning Study works in conjunction with approved Transportation Master Plans and allows planning for proper infrastructure improvements in the future.

Planned Growth – This update will ensure that developers pay for a fair share of the municipal improvements necessary to support residential growth with reliable and effective infrastructure through proper planning. This also allows developers to develop lands suitable for development, while protecting the corridors needed for providing proper infrastructure.

Organizational

Administration has capacity to complete procurement requirements, contract oversight, and Council and public engagements sessions.

Financial

The updating of Starkey Road Functional Planning study is anticipated to cost up to \$170,000. This project is recommended to be funded by the Municipal Tax Stabilization Reserve.

Alternatives Considered

Council could choose not to approve the development of a new functional planning study for Starkey Road.

Implications of Alternatives

Strategic Alignment

Not completing the Starkey Road Functional Planning Study would result in land being sterilized based on old alignment assumptions.

Not updating the report could leave the County without proper corridors established to protect planned growth areas, as well as to accommodate current traffic volumes.

Organizational

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Administration would not have the updated tools to properly review existing applications and protect Sturgeon County's future requirements. Administration may be sterilizing lands that may no longer be required, and would lack proper reporting to reflect the recently updated Area Structure Plans within Sturgeon Valley.

Financial

Future infrastructure improvements would not be captured and placed into the various Offsite Levies or onsite improvements. Efficiencies may be discovered in the completion of the Functional Planning Study, and ensure that growth is paying for growth.

Follow up Action

- 1. Engage Alberta Transportation and Economic Corridors (ATEC), draft recommendations for Q4 2025. (Development Engineering and Land Services, Q4 2025)
- 2. Carry out public engagement and complete final report of Council consideration. (Development Engineering and Land Services and Communications and Engagement Services, Q1 2026)
- 3. Incorporate findings of the study into long-term capital planning. (Development Engineering and Land Services, Q3 2026)
